Honesty - In our school we will be honest with one another in our work and play.


Through this value we recognise that we must be true to the living that God has shown us in Jesus.

What makes our school special?

- The school's vision promotes tolerance and understanding, where all are respected.
- Our staff know the pupils and families exceptionally well. Parents recognise that staff
 'go above and beyond' to meet the needs of individuals and their families and staff
 ensure all pupils, including vulnerable pupils, flourish in line with the vision.
- Pupils treat each other with dignity and respect. They show kindness to each other and have a deep understanding of individual needs, offering support and friendship.
- Staff are excellent role models. Their words and actions reflect the school's values and the vision, founded in respect, honesty, care and love. Staff ensure that pupils' learning is made relevant and fun.
- Staff ensure that upholding of the school's vision through values and pupils' good
 manners are recognised and celebrated in weekly worship. As a result, pupils take pride
 in themselves, their work, their school and they flourish.





The Curriculum

The Governing Body has a responsibility to ensure that the curriculum delivered meets the educational requirements of the Government and Local Authority. The National Curriculum, prescribed by the Government, is one part of a much larger school based curriculum that is offered here at Hurstbourne Tarrant. You can find a copy of our curriculum principles and our Learning and Teaching policy on the school website.

Programmes of study reflect detailed age related expectations across all subject areas. Prescribed age related expectations establish the knowledge, skills and understanding that the pupils should normally be expected to have reached. In English and Maths, the expectations are described for End of Years 1, 2, 4 and 6. In Science and the Foundation Subjects, there are detailed expectations for the end of Year 2 and 6.

The object of the exercise is to enable a pupil's progress to be measured against national standards, and give children, teachers, and parents a clear idea of what is expected within the framework of Key Stages.

The Foundation Stage, which covers the period prior to KS1, (Year R) is taught in Spring class. Key Stage One commences when a child starts Year 1 and ends at the close of the academic year in Year 2, this is taught in Summer class. Key Stage Two follows Key Stage One and ends at the close of the academic year in Year 6, this is taught in Autumn class (for Years 3 & 4) and Winter Class (for Years 5 & 6).

Foundation Stage

The focus of the Foundation Stage is to provide learning opportunities through fun, play based, small group learning activities. Don't be surprised if when you ask your FS child 'What did you do today?' they reply with 'I did some playing!' There will have been very careful thought put behind this to ensure targeted learning had taken place.



Religious Education

At Hurstbourne Tarrant Church of England Primary School we follow the County Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education (RE) – Living Difference - a concept driven curriculum. We also use the Understanding Christianity resources to enhance pupil understanding of Christianity. We teach predominantly the Christian religion but in line with the syllabus we also teach about other world faiths. RE offers children the opportunity to discuss and debate the big questions of life whilst comparing this with the belief systems of the Christian faith. We find that as well as direct teaching of religious matters, values can be taught by emphasising good examples as they occur in each child's daily life at school. We consider the link built up with the church, school and family are of vital importance and a keystone of the child's religious development. If for some reason you do not wish your child to take part in RE sessions at the school, you may request that they are withdrawn. We always suggest that this is done after a conversation with the class and Head teacher.

Worship

Collective worship should offer pupils opportunities to explore and share beliefs; consider the importance of prayer, reflection and silence; think about the needs of others and develop a sense of community; and, appreciate the importance of religious beliefs to those who hold them.

Each day there is an act of worship, whether as a whole school or as a class. Once a week, the local vicar leads worship in St. Peter's Church. Children learn songs, hymns, and prayers from a variety of sources, both traditional and modern. The school also takes full part in celebrating the various Christian festivals throughout the year. If for some reason you do not wish your child to take part in Collective Worship sessions at the school, you may request that they are withdrawn. We always suggest that this is done after a conversation with the class and Head teacher.





What does Voluntary - Controlled mean?

Hurstbourne Tarrant Church of England Primary School is a Voluntary Controlled School. This indicates that the County Council has taken over the ownership and responsibility of the school buildings, and is responsible for the monitoring of the main curriculum delivery, however, we are still closely linked to the village church and work closely with the Diocese of Winchester.

Children are given the opportunity to experience Worship in a way which matches their age and aptitude. All staff and children take part with honesty and integrity. However, parents do have the right to withdraw their children. Should they wish to do so, they are asked in the first instance to discuss the matter with the Head teacher.

A Celebration Worship is held once a week where we celebrate good work and behaviour. Parents are welcome to join us for this worship which is held at 2.40pm on Friday afternoons in the school hall.

Physical Education (PE)

The school is committed to delivering the full range of National Curriculum PE requirements. All children throughout the school participate and are encouraged to enjoy the benefits that Physical Education provides. Games taught and played by the school at present comprise netball, football, hockey, kwik-cricket, rugby, swimming and rounders. Opportunities to take part in competitive sport are provided through our cluster and school affiliations.

Personal, Social and Health Education

At Hurstbourne Tarrant Church of England Primary School, we believe PSHE and Citizenship helps to give pupils the knowledge, skills and understanding they need to lead confident, healthy, independent lives and to become informed active and responsible citizens. We encourage our children to play a positive role in contributing to the life of our school and the wider community. The skills are developed through activities such as circle time, Philosophy for Children, opportunities for speaking to an audience, charity fundraising, school council and the Year 5/6 residential.



Music and Drama

Over the years, the school has worked hard to develop a strong musical and drama tradition. We have an Early Years Christmas Carol Service, Key Stage 1 Nativity performance at Christmas, a Year 3/4 led Easter Service and a Year 5/6 musical play in the summer. We aim to get all children involved in one of the performances. Music and drama are key skills that we use as tools to teach other areas of the curriculum too. All children receive a weekly music session (Listen2Me) led by a music specialist. Peripatetic music tuition led by The Hampshire Music Service is available at a charge for flute, guitar, and clarinet lessons.

Special Educational Needs

Each child is nurtured at our school and is treated as an individual. Staff are constantly reviewing children's progress and future needs. If a child is considered to have a specific problem in learning, (a specific learning difficulty) e.g. in spelling, reading or mathematics, then extra time will be allocated to that child to give the appropriate specific help. Such programmes of work will be developed with the agreement of the child's parents.

In the cases where a child may have more pronounced learning difficulties, the process of obtaining fuller professional help for the child in the form of an Early Health Care Plan (previously known as a statement) will be carried out in full consultation with the parents and as swiftly as the system allows.

Pupil Premium

Children who are entitled to free school meals are automatically registered to be eligible for Pupil Premium. This money is paid directly to the school for us to put extra resources in place to ensure that these children achieve as well as everyone else. If you think you might be entitled to free school meals please visit our website where there is a web link that will help guide you through the simple process of applying.

Extra-Curricular Activities

In the spirit of 'Love of learning, Love of Life, Love of Christ', we offer an extensive range of extra curricular activities that we hope will help to enrich the curriculum and provide memorable experiences for the children of Hurstbourne Tarrant Church of England Primary School. Clubs operate at lunchtimes and after school – they are open to all children. Most are free, but some clubs charge a small fee for consumables or are run privately.

Visits

Education visits are planned for all classes to enrich the curriculum and widen the children's knowledge and understanding of the world around them. These can include visits to local farms, museums, wildlife centres, theatres, sporting fixtures etc. and also a residential experience for the older children in Years 5 and 6. When arrangements are made for children to leave the school site, parents will be given details in advance and asked for their consent. The school budget does not extend to funding these out of school experiences and we are not allowed by law to charge for these activities. We do however ask parents if they would make a voluntary contribution to cover the costs involved. The friends of the school also contribute 50% towards the cost of the coaches to try to keep the cost of activities to a minimum.

Behaviour

At Hurstbourne Tarrant Church of England Primary School, we believe in the education of the whole child within a safe, caring and positive environment. Our 'Good Behaviour Policy' encourages children to make active choices about how they conduct themselves at school. It is based on a great deal of praise and encouragement but clearly states the consequences of poor behaviour choices.

We aim to continue and improve upon the excellent behaviour of our pupils and we welcome parents to our 'Celebration Worship', which takes place on Friday afternoons in the school hall where good behaviour and values are celebrated.



Homework

We believe that learning activities undertaken at home can make a significant contribution to a child's progress at school. It should provide parents with an understanding of how they can support their child's learning. The children receive a variety of homework activities depending on their age, Children are also expected to read with parents every day.

Parents' Evenings

Parents' evenings are held twice a year, one in autumn and one in the spring. Targets are discussed and explained so that parents can support their children at home. Additional meetings are held for those children who have special educational needs. A full progress report is also sent home in June.

Friends of Hurstbourne Tarrant

The Friends of Hurstbourne Tarrant School work together to raise money to buy extra equipment that the school identifies such as interactive whiteboards, whole class musical instruments and they also subsidise half the cost of all coaches for school trips.

There are a variety of fundraising and social events throughout the year culminating with a Summer Fair in the summer term. Membership is open to all parents, carers and anyone associated with the school. Everyone is welcome.

School Council

The School Council is made up of 1 representative from each year group. Regular meetings are held to discuss and decide on a range of issues affecting the children. The children are also responsible for organising charity days. Children are democratically elected for a year and voting takes place in school after children have made speeches and created campaign posters.

The Governing Body

The school governors have important legal and supervisory functions in the school's management. They hold regular meetings and have informed knowledge of the life of the school. Working in conjunction with us, they ensure that the requirements of the Education Reform Act 1988 and supplementary statutory obligations are fulfilled. The normal term of office for a governor is four years.
